Órcheandacht leathán – spóil chluaisne

Ts eol dúinn anois gur spóil chluaisne iad na deoráin a d'ugraí 'bascaí' orthu rannha seos. Sheet gold work – ear-spoils

The objects previously called 'bascaí' are now identified as ear-spoils. The spoils were fitted into the pierced and distended earlobes by stretching it around the spoils. Several pairs of ear-spoils have survived. In Ireland three different types of ear-spoil can be identified.

Type 1 is like a closed 'bas'. The pair from Ballinader, Co. Wickford is an example of this type.

Type 2 is a hollow-shaped ear-spoil. Because the diameter of the spoils is very small, the spoils are fitted into the top of the earlobes. Examples are known from Carraig, Co. Tipperary, Ballinader and near Kesh, Co. Wickford.

Type 3, such as the pair from near Mullingar, is much thicker than the others so that the ear-spoil projects forwards and backwards as the earlobe grips it at the centre.

Some ear-spoils contain small gold pellets which jangle lightly with the movement of the head. Ear-spoils and the terminals of the large gold collars are very similar to one another in both construction and decoration. They are decorated with concentric circles and other motifs as symbolising the power of the sun.
